What is a MOOC

- Massive Open Online Course
- Online Education Course on steroids
- Can accommodate large numbers of students at once
- Typically free, some charge a fee for certification
- Instructor acts as a facilitator

Seated Classes vs MOOCS

Seated Classes

- Physical Classroom
- Instructor knowledge delivery
- Instructor led
- Purchased textbooks
- For credit
- Class size less than 1k
- Tuition charged

MOOCs

- Online
- Student knowledge generation*
- Instructor facilitated
- Open access materials *
- Typically no credit*
- Class size 100 to 100,000
- Typically free*
- * Changing with the new versions

Teaching Strategies

- Discussion board posts peer to peer interaction
- Videos of lectures
- PowerPoint slides
- Readings
- Quizzes
- Group projects
- Final Exam



How are MOOCS used?

- For personal enrichment
- For corporate training
- To supplement seated courses
 - Provides a hybrid experience
- > For a marketing opportunity
- For no-cost learning opportunity for older students to try out college.
- Testing new teaching methods
- Remedial education

Learning Challenges

- Students must be self-directed learners
- Students without prerequisite skills or computer instruction struggle
- Little if any individualized instructor attention
- Lack of emphasis on individual learner needs though this changing

Early MOOCs: 2009-2012

- Based on Constructivist philosophy with emphasis on peer to peer learning
- No pre-reqs to take a class
- Free
- Low level of faculty interaction
- Designed for the life-long learning market
- Majority were enrolled in Coursera's MOOCs
 - 65% of all students enrolled in Coursera's
 MOOCS were outside the US.

Recent MOOCS: 2013 -

- MOOCs that are equivalent to courses in a university's own degree programs
- Hybrid "hMOOCS" used along side seated courses
- "xMOOCs"- utilize the conventional lecture model and delivered through an LMS (e.g. Blackboard)
- College credit and certifications available

Recent MOOCS: 2013 -

- Some charge fees
- Identity authentication
- Test proctoring
- Full MOOC Degree Programs (e.g. Georgia Tech MSCS)

MOOC Course Topics

- Art, Language, Literature, Music, Film
- Computer Science
- Business, Marketing, Economics, Finance, Management
- Engineering
- **Math**
- Medicine and Pharmacology,
- Personal and Professional Development
- Social Sciences
- Science (Biology, Chemistry, Physics, Physical)

Challenges with MOOCs

- High dropout rates (as much as 90%) for non-hybrid models.
- Financial sustainability (most are funded by grants or donations)
- Accessibility
- Quality standards and assessments
- Plagiarism
- Copyright and legal issues many use open access materials.
- Many rely on open access materials.
 - Textbook publishers may be looking at new ways to provide materials for MOOCs at fee.

Credit for MOOCs

- Majority of MOOCs are not granted college credit.
- California State U and Antioch University are offering MOOCs for credit
 - Partnering with Udacity and edX, and Coursera

Credit for MOOCs

- ACE has reviewed and recommended the granting of credit for some MOOCs.
 - Not all colleges accept ACE recommendations.
 - Some colleges require an additional assessment
- Prior Learning Assessment (credit for prior learning) colleges validate learning through exam, course review, and portfolio review.

Credit For MOOCS

- edX Allows students to take final exam at a physical testing center.
- Coursera Offers special certificates for a fee
 - authentication of identity and exam proctoring.
- Reciprocal agreements between colleges who offer MOOCS.
- It is up to each college to determine transferability of MOOCs.

 - Current14 fully online Degrees

Crown College MOOC

MOOC Initiative Vision: To serve the Christian community by promoting biblical literacy and to expand the influence of Crown Online.



Why provide a MOOC?

- To provide educational opportunities to those beyond the Crown College Campus.
- To provide learning opportunities that can be used by churches and their congregations to further their Biblical knowledge.
- To provide an opportunity for students to try an online course with minimal cost.
- As a marketing opportunity for Crown College

New Testament MOOC

- First offered July 2013; again in spring 2014
- Adapted teaching strategies to fit the target population and goals of the MOOC.
- Goal of 500 participants being led by 10 volunteer instructors.
- Integrated a variety of collaborative learning activities.
- Integrated learning mastery tests to accommodate the course size
- Utilized a final proficiency exam.

New Testament MOOC

- Option for a proctored Proficiency Exam (fee)
- Students who scored 80% on the exam and who enrolled at Crown College subsequent to the MOOC were granted proficiency credit.
- Students have one year from the time the proficiency test was taken to enroll at Crown College in order to receive proficiency credit.

- **July 2013**
- Week 1 Participants: 165 of 327
- > 50.5% Response Rate

Age (n = 165 participants)

- \circ < 18 (.006%; n = 1)
- 0.018-29 (19.4%; n = 32)
- \circ 30-44 (26.6%; n = 44)
- \circ 45-60 (36.4%; n = 60)
- $\circ >60 (13.9\%; n = 23)$

How did you learn about the MOOC? (n = 165)

- Social Media (20.6 %; n = 34)
- \circ Friend (19.4%; n = 32)
- Church / Denomination (39.4 %; n = 65)
- \circ Internet (4.2 %; n = 7)
- Denominational Convention (3.6%; n = 6)
- \circ Other (10.9%; n = 18)

Level of Education Completed?

- \circ HS/GED (23.6 %; n = 39)
- \circ Associate Degree (13.3%; n = 22)
- \circ Bachelor's Degree (32.7 %; n = 54)
- \circ Graduate Degree (19.4 %; n = 32)
- \circ Other (8.5%; n=14)

Are you planning to take the proficiency exam?

- \circ Yes (37.5%; n = 62)
- \circ No (23.8%; n = 39)
- \circ Maybe (36.3%; n = 60)

Are you planning to pursue further education?

- \circ Yes (25.5%; n = 42)
- \circ No (48.5%; n = 80)
- \circ Maybe (23.6%; n = 39)

Post-Course Survey Summer 2013


- Week 7 Participants 34 (of 61)
 - o (55.7% Response Rate)

$$Age (n = 34)$$

- \circ <18 (2.9%; n = 1)
- 0 18-29 (5.8%; n = 2)
- \circ 30-44 (32.4%; n = 11)
- \circ 45-60 (44.1%; n = 15)
- \circ >60 (11.8; n = 4)

Note: The drop in participation among **18-29** year olds.

Summer 2013 MOOC Data

Summer 2013 MOOC Data

- Enrollment to completion: 11%
- Participation to completion: 19%
 - Created a flexible group structure to account for attrition.
- Completed the proficiency exam: 13
- Matriculated: 6

Post-Course Survey

Summer 2013 (N=34)

Are you planning to pursue a degree?

- Applied to Crown Bachelor's Degree (14.7%; n = 5)
- Applied to a Crown Graduate Degree (8.8%; n = 3)
- Investigating Educational Opportunities (11.8%; n = 4)
- \circ No (41.2%; n = 14)
- \circ Maybe (23.5%; n = 8)

Spring 2014 MOOC Data

Understanding the New Testament offered again.

- Pre-enrolled for the course: 247
- Enrollment to completion: 8%
- Participation to completion: 17%
- Completed the proficiency exam: 10
- Matriculated: 4

Enrollment Process

- Self-enroll on MOOC site (CourseSites)
- Minimal impact on Crown IT
- Positive feedback from enrollment team
- Alumni Partnership
 - Unintended Consequence deficient graduates wanted to take the MOOC to finish requirements.

Proficiency Exam

- Preparing the Exam
 - (utilized content expert)
- Communication with students
- Proficiency Exam (1 week window)
- Proctoring Service (Remote Proctor Now \$15 Fee)
- Documented results to inform Registrar

Proficiency Exam

- Documentation of exam results is held in an electronic file in document image system.
- Results posted as proficiency credit on the transcript upon completion of first regular Crown College Course.
- Shows as "History of the New Testament" grade of "PR" for 3 semester credits.

Proficiency Credit Usage

- Toward a Crown Degree (43.5%; n = 10)
- Unused or Unknown (43.5%; n = 10
- Also CEU (Continuing Education) (13%; n = 3)
 - Association for Christian Schools International (ACSI)
 - Biblical studies requirement of the denomination

Future MOOC Plans

- January 2015 Course Understanding the Old Testament
- Established a fund to receive donations for future MOOCs with the Advancement Office
- Goal of writing a grant proposal by the summer of 2015
- Plan to offer a different course in July 2015
